In the depths of the Second World War, Dame Myra Hess realised that in dark times the human spirit needed music more than ever. She established the National Gallery concerts and audiences, amazingly risking the blitz, bravely flocked to support them. Dame Myra's efforts eventually contributed to the formation of the Arts Council, and so through the darkest of times the future of Britain's cultural life was assured.

As we proceed into the unknown depths of this reckless financial crisis, we utterly count on your support to contribute to our own "war effort". If you've already heard our award-winning Handel Opus 6 CDs (which have been exceptionally well reviewed), you'll be delighted to know that we will be recording Corelli's complete published works in the near future. The Italian composer Corelli taught the violin and composition to Geminiani, who in turn taught our own Charles Avison, so you could say that Corelli was the musical grandfather of our hero! It is therefore apt that we are setting out to record the complete published works of Corelli in time for the tercentenary of his death in 2013. This summer you can experience some of the delights of his Trios and Concerti Grossi in concert.

Finally, with my cello in hand I will be teaming up with the brilliant young Canadian pianist Kathy Chi for concerts in May, doing our bit to raise funds for the Avison Ensemble's education programmes. We will roll up our sleeves and learn millions of notes in our programme of Chopin and Shostakovich, so wouldn't it be great if we could achieve £1 per note to expand our fantastic education work in the North East...? Please do come along and contribute – the programme "*Desperate Romantics!*" will be very exciting!

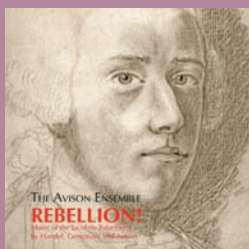

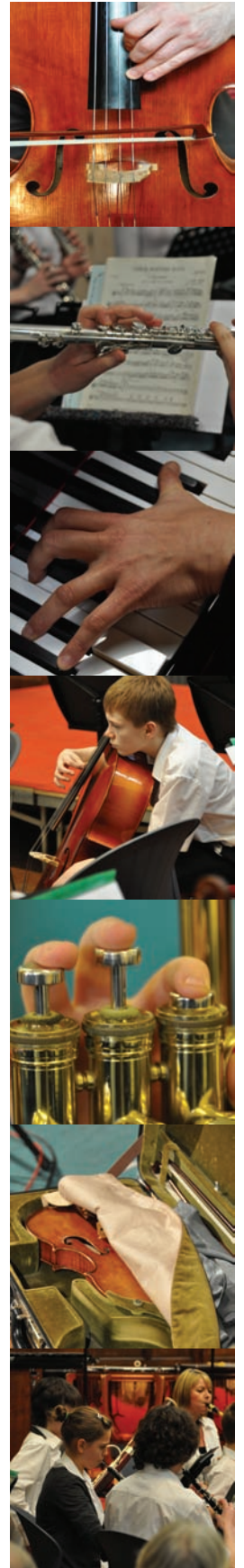

DESPERATE ROMANTICS!

The cello and piano sonatas of Chopin and Shostakovich are monumental works of the repertoire, but the dramatic context of their creation is little known.

Chopin's last work was born out of his turbulent love affair with the writer George Sand, who finally refused to visit the composer as he lay dying. It was the last piece of music he heard and his last memory of his lover, having requested it to be performed to him on his deathbed.

In 1936 Shostakovich premiered his cello sonata on the eve of his denouncement in *Pravda* by Stalin, heralding dangerous times for the composer, who earlier that year had divorced his wife in order to be with his lover, only to then be rejected by her and amazingly end up re-marrying his former wife before the end of the year!

ROMAN JEWELS: A CORELLI SUMMER FESTIVAL



The composer and violinist Arcangelo Corelli was born in Italy in 1653, a full generation before Bach or Handel, and established an academy of literati that later became the Arcadian Academy. Thanks to his musical achievements and growing international reputation he found no trouble in obtaining the support of a succession of influential patrons. History has remembered him with such titles as “Founder of Modern Violin Technique,” the “World’s First Great Violinist,” and the “Father of the Concerto Grosso.”

Corelli’s popularity as a violinist was equaled by his acclaim as a composer, yet his compositional output was rather small. All of his creations are included in six opus numbers, most of them being devoted to serious and popular sonatas and trio sonatas.

Chronologically, Corelli was Avison’s ‘musical grandfather’ and our summer concerts will cover the trio sonatas and the Concerti Grossi Opus 6 in which work Corelli reached his creative peak and climaxed all his musical contributions.

The concerts will be presented in 2 series during July. The trios from July 1st – 3rd and the Concerti Grossi from July 21st to 23rd. Visit our website for details of the programmes, which differ for each concert on tour. www.avisonensemble.com

PAXTON FESTIVAL AT PAXTON HOUSE



This year the Avison Ensemble has been asked to help launch the Paxton Music Festival with two concerts taking place on the same day – July 17th at 1pm and another at 7.30pm – the first is a lunchtime solo performance on baroque violin from the Ensemble’s Leader and Director Pavlo Beznosiuk.

Pavlo is one of Europe’s most respected Baroque violinists, and is presenting a programme focussing on the Austro-German

school of unaccompanied violin music. He will perform music by two lesser-known composer/violinists renowned in their day for their virtuosity, Biber for his brilliant passage-work and Westhoff for his development of the violin’s polyphonic capabilities. The programme ends with Bach’s monumental sonata in C major, a towering piece of writing for solo violin and one of the most challenging works of the entire baroque repertoire.

At the evening concert The Avison Ensemble presents a programme of chamber music composed for the opulent surroundings of Arcangelo Corelli’s patron, Cardinal Ottoboni. This programme combines the sumptuous and much-imitated sonorities of Corelli’s deft writing for the violin with music from two lesser-known Romans, the lutenist Zamboni and the harpsichordist and long-term Corelli collaborator, Bernardo Pasquini. Also making a rare appearance is Domenico Gabrielli, credited with writing the first ever sonatas for violoncello.

YOUNG MUSICIANS’ AWARDS 2011



The Avison Ensemble’s Young Musicians’ Awards go from strength to strength each year, and recently we welcomed more young talented musicians through to the finals than ever before.

Held in the presence of the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Newcastle, the finals were held at Shipley Art Gallery on February 27th and were supported by the Roland Cookson Fund at the Community Foundation.

The winners of this year’s Awards were talented grade 1 pianist, Aleksandar Jovanovic (10), from Heaton, an outstanding grade 5 flautist, Julia Lochmuller (13), from Newcastle, and a second extraordinary pianist (Dip. ABRSM) Sarah Gardner (15), from Stockton-on-Tees.

The competition was open to over 250 schools across the North East and the 13 finalists were selected over two sets of heats. The finalists were judged by Mark Monument, recently retired from the Arts Council North East where he held the position of specialist officer in music. Mark was also an examiner for the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music.

The Awards themselves are 3 beautiful, unique engraved glass trophies, inscribed with music from the Avison workbooks and were created by Dominic Fondé, a local glass artist. The winners also received a cheque for £25 each and the awards will be displayed in their schools: Jesmond Primary School, Central Newcastle High School and Yarm School, Stockton-on-Tees.

Sunday March 6th saw the first concert performed by the children of the Young Musicians Awards and two of our education partner organisations, the Choir of St Nicholas' Cathedral and the Gateshead Youth Orchestra. Held in the presence of Her Grace The Dowager Duchess of Northumberland, the evening was a resounding success with all the young people taking part performing their solos, or orchestral works with a professional quality that left the audience elated and spellbound!

No one performance could be singled out for special praise, but the 3 winners of his year's YMA competition did prove that public concerts heighten performance technique. The young performers received their prizes from the Lord Mayor of Newcastle, Cllr Brenda Hindmarsh. We hope to hold a similar event next year.
